## **Lily Pads**

While pretty and a good habitat for fish, the lily pads can be crowding and annoying as well. For those who haven't ever seen one, (probably most of us!), this pic is a lily pad root. They look like a thin pineapple and can go 14-18 inches deep into the lake bottom. Treatment with pellets is done in late summer / early fall, with the thinning work then occurring over the winter months. When the lake is down and lakefront residents do maintenance on the lakebed adjacent to their homes, these can be thinned along with raking of the fallen leaves. However, it's not a job for the faint of heart, as they break very easily and you have to keep digging to get them out. New plants will grow from the broken pieces. Anybody that has tried to rake muck has hit these roots.
